Musical Trivia – Miscellaneous Tidbits

The Italian composer, **Jean-Baptiste Lully**, hit a staff on the ground to keep time when the orchestra plays. One time, he missed the ground and hit his foot. The stab created a deep wound that led to a condition called gangrene (dead tissue due to an infection/lack of blood flow), which caused his death.

Mozart wrote the *Overture To Don Giovanni* on the morning of the concert while having a hangover from drinking too much the night before.

Haydn's head was stolen and a replacement skull was put in his tomb. When the real skull was restored in 1954, the substitute wasn't removed. The tomb contains 2 skulls.

Fanny Mendelssohn was just as talented as her younger brother -child prodigy **Felix**. Due to the attitudes toward women at that time, **Felix** admitted to publishing some of her works under his own name to avoid retaliation to her.

The "short – short – short – long" motif at the start of **Beethoven's** 5th Symphony is Morse Code for the letter "**V**". The Allied forces used it in the propaganda campaign for World War II "**V for Victory**".

Domenico Scarlatti's *Cat Fugue* was inspired by his cat walking along the keyboard.


Tschaikovsky described his famous *1812 Overture* as "loud and noisy" and "obviously written without warmth or love".

John Cage's 4 Minutes 33 Seconds is 4 minutes 33 seconds of silence. His work (?) As Slow as Possible was started in 2001 and will finish in 2640. The most recent note was played from 2013 to 2020. Yves Klein's Monotone Silence Symphony is 20 minutes of a long held note followed by 20 minutes of silence. The group Bloodhound Gang recorded The 10 Coolest Things About New Jersey – it is 10 seconds of silence.

So many fans of **Franz Liszt** asked for a lock of his hair, that he kept a dog whose hair he would shear and send it as his own.

A student wrote to **John Lennon** to say that a teacher asked them to analyze their lyrics. He then wrote *I Am The Walrus* with deliberately meaningless confusing lyrics. **Paul McCartney** wrote *Yesterday* and was convinced that he had plagiarized it.
